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Special Award Nominations Also Sought

Fellows Nominations Due April 13

The deadline for submitting nominations for the honorary Degree of Fellow is April 13, 2015. The minimum eligibility requirements for consideration are two consecutive years of Active ACOI membership and certification by either the American Osteopathic Board of Internal Medicine or the American Board of Internal Medicine. Nomination packets have been mailed to all current Fellows, as well as those who are eligible through AOBIM certification. Interested members who are certified by the ABIM are asked to contact the ACOI office for an application as the College does not maintain a complete list of ABIM-certified physicians.

Nominations also are sought for the Internist, Researcher and Teacher of the Year Awards, Master Fellow and Resident Humanism and Teaching Award (see criteria below). The deadline for nominations for these awards is May 15.

The three special awards made to members of the ACOI are Teacher of the Year, Researcher of the Year and Internist of the Year. The awards are given annually when qualified candidates are identified and include a \$1,000 stipend to defray the cost of traveling to the annual convention. 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Letter from the President

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have enough qualified and talented physicians to take care of our young and aging populations. It's predicted by AAMC (American Association of Medical Colleges) and others that by 2025 we will face a significant shortage of 100,000 physicians if we don't expand GME availability. I am concerned about whether effective health care can be delivered to rural America and underserved populations who will potentially have to drive hundreds of miles for basic medical care. I also worry about the impact this may have on physicians' offices facing the increased burden of trying to fit in patients when there is no room, or to see them before and after official office hours. Many of us are already experiencing this. Contrary to what some believe, we cannot afford to hire more staff, midlevels and physicians to fill these voids at today's low reimbursement rates, especially if you rely on government reimbursement and third party payers who follow their lead.

So, you may be wondering where am I'm going with this. This past week I had the privilege to sit in on the meetings of our Council on Education and Evaluation. This Council has the responsibility to ensure that our internal medicine residents and fellows matriculate through top quality programs which our College and the public can be proud of. I, for one, did not know the magnitude and depth of consideration that is given to each program review and the assistance provided to programs which may need support and guidance. The members appointed to this Council have been given the essential task of leading our College's efforts to maintain a level of post graduate training that is second to none.

This group of talented individuals is dedicated and passionate about what they do to ensure quality education. As I mentioned above, these are not paid positions. The Council members step away from their day-to-day activities as clinicians, program directors and academicians. There is also resident and fellow representation. Their contributions are vital to the success of the College as we restructure and reinvent ourselves in the face of unified GME accreditation. It is also important to remember that our residents are our future and will care for all of us one day.

House Votes to Repeal ACA

The House recently voted to repeal the Affordable Care Act by a vote of 239-186. The vote was mostly along party lines with three Republicans voting against the bill. This marks the 56th time that the House has voted to repeal or modify the ACA since it was enacted. While the legislation was approved overwhelmingly by the House, the Administration has indicated that it will veto the bill should it be presented for signature. According to the White House, repeal of the ACA would result in millions of Americans losing access to affordable health insurance coverage and would increase Medicare spending. The mostly-symbolic vote did differ from previous attempts to repeal the ACA in that the legislation directs House committees of jurisdiction to put forth legislative proposals to replace the ACA with legislation that meets specific goals. It appears unlikely that this legislation will be approved by the Senate. The Supreme Court is expected to hear oral arguments on a case examining the ACA in March with a ruling to follow this summer. Depending on the ruling of the Court, additional action on the ACA could follow.

CMS Announces Coverage for Lung Cancer Screening

The Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS) issued a national coverage determination (NCD) for Medicare coverage of screening for lung cancer with low dose computer tomography (LDCT) if certain eligibility requirements are met, effective February 5. The Decision Memo (CAG-00439N) lists the specific eligibility criteria for beneficiaries, reading radiologists and radiology imaging facilities. Generally, a Medicare beneficiary is eligible for the preventive service benefit if they meet the following criteria: 55-77 years of age; asymptomatic; tobacco smoking habit of at least 30 pack years; current smoker or one who has quit smoking in the last 15 years; and receives a written order for LDCT lung cancer screening that meets the criteria outlined in the memo. 2015 NHSC Loan Repayment Program Application Cycle Open

The 2015 National Health Service Corps (NHSC) Loan Repayment Program application cycle is now open and will close on March 30, 2015 at 7:30 PM Eastern Time.

This program provides loan repayment assistance to licensed primary care medical, dental, and mental and behavioral health providers who serve in communities with limited access to health care. Eligible providers can receive up to \$50,000 to repay their health professional student loans in exchange for a two-year commitment to work at an approved NHSC site in a high-need, underserved area. The payment is free from Federal income tax and is made at the beginning of service so loans can be more quickly paid down. There are both full-time and half-time service options.

The 2015 application cycle is expected to be competitive. On average, it can take up to three weeks to complete an application so applicants are encouraged to apply early. The process may improve this year for applicants now that some loan information can be automatically populated by the National Student Loan Data System. House Committee Considers Medicare Physician Payment Reform

The House Energy and Commerce Health subcommittee recently conducted a hearing to examine efforts to reform the Medicare Sustainable Growth Rate (SGR) formula. Without congressional action, physicians face a nearly 21 percent reduction in Medicare reimbursements on April 1. The two-day hearing included testimony that looked at potential reforms, costs of the reforms and the need to end the annual threat of reductions in Medicare reimbursement. ACOI member Geraldine O'Shea, DO, provided testimony on the need for permanent reform and the importance of expanding coordinated care in the restructuring of the current payment model. Previously approved legislation was reviewed and identified as a solid foundation for future negotiations. While there was general agreement on the need to repeal and replace the SGR and address the annual threat of reductions in Medicare physician reimbursement, there was no agreement on how to pay for the approximate \$140 billion cost. The same concerns derailed legislative progress in 2014.

CMS Announces Plan to Reform Medicare Payment Model

CMS has announced plans to shift traditional fee-for-service Medicare to one that pays for value and care coordination. According to a document released by CMS, the focus will be on the following three areas: improving the way providers are paid; improving and innovating in care delivery; and sharing information more broadly to providers, consumers and others to support better decisions while maintaining privacy. According to CMS, it intends to tie 30 percent of payments to quality and effectiveness by the end of 2016

Are you Prepared for the Transition to ICD-10?

The ICD-10 compliance date of October 1, 2015 is quickly approaching. To assist in the transition to ICD-10 code sets, the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS) released Road to 10. The online resource is a no-cost tool to help you get an overview of ICD-10, explore specialty references including internal medicine-specific information, and build an action plan to help in the successful transition to the ICD-10 code sets. ICD-10 will affect diagnosis and inpatient procedure coding for everyone covered by the Health Insurance Portability Accountability Act (HIPAA), not just those who submit Medicare and Medicaid claims. 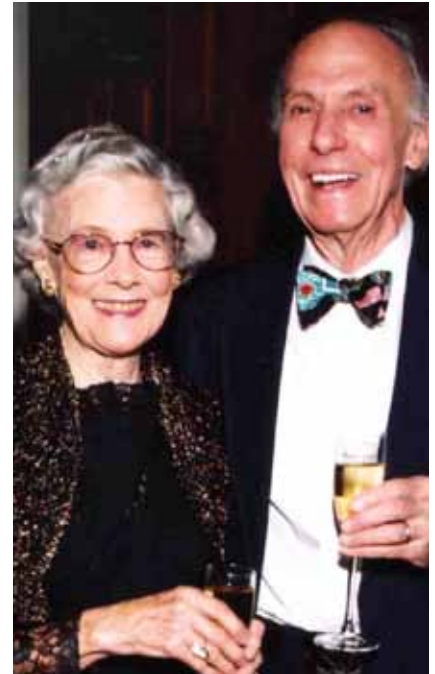

Hospital Medicine Exam Date Announced

The American Osteopathic Board of Internal Medicine (AOBIM) has announced that it will administer the Focused Practice in Hospital Medicine Recertification (OCC) Examination on August 22, 2015 in Lombard, Illinois. Recertification in internal medicine with a focus in hospital medicine is available as part of a five-year pilot program approved by the AOA two years ago. The examination will be a pencil and paper examination this year.

The program is for clinicians who concentrate their clinical practice in the diagnosis and management of hospitalized patients. It is available only to those who hold an active certification or recertification certificate in internal medicine. Those who successfully complete the requirements will be issued an OCC certificate in Focused Practice in Hospital Medicine. There has been some confusion regarding whether holders of this credential remain certified in internal medicine. The new credential is an internal medicine recertification; however, it replaces the original time-limited general internal medicine certification or recertification held by the candidate. If a candidate's practice reverts to general internal medicine in the future he or she may complete the OCC requirements for general internal medicine in order to maintain their certification.

may include, but are not limited to:

- Recognition through the receipt of teaching awards for excellence in teaching in undergraduate or graduate medical education;
- Leadership as a program director, course director or director of medical education in which valuable contributions to the profession and a positive impact on a significant number of trainees have been made;
- Development of a model program that has led to innovation in osteopathic medical education;
- Receipt of Federal or foundation grants;
- Publication of articles on medical education in medical education journals.

Researcher of the Year

One who has made major contributions to clinical or basic research related to osteopathic internal medicine as demonstrated by:

- A substantial record of extramural funding from Federal or foundation sources, such as the National Institutes of Health, American Osteopathic Association, the American Heart Association, etc.;
- Publications of original research in referred journals;
- Discovery of new technology, therapeutic interventions, or a new approach to clinical care that has had a significant impact on clinical care.

Internist of the Year

One who has made major contributions to osteopathic internal medicine as demonstrated by:

- The opinion of osteopathic internal medicine leaders relative to clinical excellence;
- Receipt of awards recognizing clinical excellence from hospitals, state healthcare organizations and the community;
- Development of a model clinical program that has made an impact on osteopathic internal medicine;
- Leadership role in clinical direction as a chief of medicine, medical director, etc.;
- Recognition of bedside teaching excellence;
- Excellence as a mentor and role model for osteopathic residents and students.

Master Fellowship

Nominations are sought for candidates for the Grover Gillum Society of Master Fellows, which honors osteopathic internists who have achieved superiority in clinical practice, teaching or research. Individuals accepted for membership will have demonstrated that their participation has raised the level of excellence of the organizations in which they participate. To be considered, a candidate must be a Fellow who is nominated by letter specifically outlining the candidate's qualifications.

Resident Teaching, Humanism Award

The Board of Directors is seeking nominations for an award recognizing residents and fellows for excellence in teaching and humanistic qualities. The award honors compassion in the delivery of care, respect for patients, their families and healthcare colleagues, as well as demonstrated excellence in clinical teaching. The Board has approved funding for four awards this year, which will be made at the Convention in the Fall. Each awardee will receive a \$500 prize, plus up to \$1000 in expenses to attend the Convention.

ACGME Appointments

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The appointments occurred as part of the transition process to a single accreditation system for graduate medical education (GME). The RC-IM is responsible for the ACGME internal medicine training requirements, and also will determine whether osteopathic residency and fellowship programs meet the ACGME requirements for accreditation. The AOA has determined that it will cease accrediting GME in 2020.

The three appointees were selected from six nominations recommended by the ACOI and made by the AOA. Dr. Schaller is a cardiologist and past president of the College. A member and past chairman of the Council on Education and Evaluation, he is program director of the internal medicine residency at Valley Hospital in Las Vegas, Nevada. 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and 50 percent by 2018. At present, about 20 percent of Medicare payments are paid through programs that expose providers to financial risk for their performance or at least require them to collect and report quality measures. With the Federal government paying \$362 billion to Medicare providers in 2014, it is clear that it will continue to look for ways to increase efficiency in the dollars that are spent. With private providers often following the Government's lead, the ACOI will continue to carefully monitor CMS' efforts to implement these proposed changes.

Washington Tidbits: How Many Members of the House are There?

It is often said that Congress consists of 435 Representatives and 100 Senators. This stated fact is a little misleading. In fact, there are more members of the House than are traditionally acknowledged when discussing the size of Congress. The House also contains Delegates from Washington, DC, Guam, American Samoa, the U.S. Virgin Islands, and the Northern Mariana Islands. They are elected every two years like other members of the House. There is also a Resident Commissioner from Puerto Rico who is elected every four years. The delegates and commissioner possess the same powers as other members of the House in that they serve on committees, speak on the House floor and introduce legislation. They may not, however, vote on final passage of a bill. They also perform the same constituent services as a Representative. Article I of the Constitution provides only for Representatives and Senators. The position of Delegate and Resident Commissioner are established under federal law through Title 48 of the U.S. Code and governed by the rules of the House.
